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## **TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1990 FULL**

<b>Description:</b>	Incorporation of land into residential curtilage and erection of domestic wooden shed and associated fencing - Retrospective		

**South Holland District Council, in pursuance of the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended), hereby give notice that permission has been REFUSED (or equivalent) for the development referred to above, for the following reason(s):**

- 1 Policy 2 of the adopted South East Lincolnshire Local Plan (SELLP, 2019) states that proposals requiring planning permission for development will be permitted provided that sustainable development considerations are met, specifically in relation to size, scale, layout, density and impact on the amenity, trees, character and appearance of the area and the relationship to existing development and land uses. Policy 3 of the adopted South East Lincolnshire Local Plan (SELLP, 2019) states that development proposals will demonstrate how an acceptable design of development including residential amenity will be secured. Policy 30 of the adopted South East Lincolnshire Local Plan (SELLP, 2019) states that development proposals will not be permitted where they would lead to unacceptable adverse impacts on the amenities of the area.

The fence and shed would comprise an oppressive addition and would adversely harm the street scene and locality due its height, extent and proximity to the footpath. There are

no similar designs of 1.8m high fences along Postland Road or the front of Eastlands, further exacerbating this anomaly which comprises an incongruous addition alongside the shed being located and heavily visible from such a prominent plot on the corner of two roads.

The proposal is not considered to be acceptable and is considered to be contrary to Policies 2 and 3 of the South East Lincolnshire Local Plan (SELLP, 2019) and Paragraph 135 of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF, December 2024). The limited benefits of the development would not outweigh the identified harm that would arise.

**Notes:**

The Local Planning Authority has acted positively and proactively in determining this application by assessing it against all material considerations, including national guidance, planning policies and representations that have been received during the public consultation exercise. However, the issues are so fundamental to the proposal, due to the harm which has been clearly identified within the reason(s) for the refusal, that approval has not been possible.

## RIGHTS OF APPEAL

### Appeals to the Secretary of State

If you are aggrieved by the decision of your Local Planning Authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or grant consent subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Secretary of State under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 or Section 20 of the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act 1990.

### Timescales for appealing

The deadlines for appeals are calculated from the **date of decision** and are as follows for the types of applications below:

If you intend to submit an appeal that you would like examined by inquiry then you must notify the Local Planning Authority and Planning Inspectorate ([inquiryappeals@planning-inspectorate.gov.uk](mailto:inquiryappeals@planning-inspectorate.gov.uk)) at least 10 days before submitting the appeal. Further details are on GOV.UK.

### Enforcement Notices

If an enforcement notice was served prior to the planning application being determined then the deadline for appealing is 28 days from the date of the **planning refusal**.

If an enforcement notice is served after the planning application is determined then the deadline for appealing is 28 days from the date of the **enforcement notice** OR the **timescales stated above for each application type** from the date of the planning refusal - whichever is sooner.

The Secretary of State can allow a longer period for giving notice of an appeal but will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in

giving notice of appeal.

The Secretary of State need not consider an appeal if it seems to the Secretary of State that the Local Planning Authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions they imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any development order and to any directions given under the order.

### **Purchase Notices**

If either the Local Planning Authority or the Secretary of State refuses permission to develop land or grant it subject to conditions the owner may claim that he can neither put the land to a reasonably beneficial use in its existing state nor can he render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted.

In these circumstances the owner may serve a purchase notice on the Council in whose area the land is situated. This notice will require the Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of the Part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 or Section 32 of the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act 1990.

### **Compensation**

In certain circumstances compensation may be claimed from the Local Planning Authority if permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on reference of the application to him.

These circumstances are set out in Section 114 and related provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 and Section 27 of the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act 1990.
