POTTERY

Introduction

All the material was recorded at archive level in accordance with the guidelines laid out in Barclay et al (2016). The Medieval and post Medieval pottery codenames (Cname) are in accordance with the Post Roman pottery type series for Lincolnshire, as published in Young et al. (2005).

One fragment from a single vessel, weighing 35g was recovered from the site.

Methodology

The material was laid out, viewed and weighed. The pottery was examined visually and using x20 magnification. This information was then added to an Access database. An archive of the pottery is included in Table 1.
